DIRECTOR'S REFLECTION

Dear Companions on the Journey,

Ash Wednesday is on the near horizon, marking the beginning of the Church's season of Lent. Old-time Catholics will remember a time when giving up candy was a typical Lenten practice, a self-induced deprivation to discipline oneself during this season of penance. Recent years have suggested more positive practices, How about these?

- 1. Make a commitment to read the Sunday readings *before* you go to Mass. A way of experiencing Sunday worship more deeply.
- 2. Use a daily reflection book (get one at the Center Chapel entrance) to center yourself and guide yourself during the 40 Days of Lent.
- 3. Online daily reflections from Jesuit Creighton University: https:// onlineministries.creighton.edu/ CollaborativeMinistry/daily.html>
- 4. Join us at the Paulist Center for **Taizé Prayer**, **Tuesdays**, **7pm**
- 5. We can see the portrait of our soul through the lens of our wallet: think about what you usually spend your money on. Clothes? Lattés? Dinner out? Pick one type of expenditure that you'll "fast" from during Lent and then give the money you would usually spend to a local charity.
- 6. Or bigger: where do you spend *your time*? The average American spends about 4½ hours/day on their smart phone. Why not take something on 40 days of letter writing, 40 acts of kindness, 40 phone calls to the important people in your life?
- 7. If you don't have a crucifix in your room, buy a simple one and put it in your bedroom.
- 8. Read the entire Gospel of Mark www.usccb.org/bible/mark/1> in one sitting. As the shortest Gospel, it is the most concise story of Jesus' life, and the Cross plays an even more prominent role than in the other Gospels.
- 9. Our Young Adult Ministry is going to lead the community in the **Stations of the Cross on Friday, 10 April, 7pm** (www.bustedhalo.com/ministry-resources/what-are-the-statons-of-the-cross-2, if you don't know!).

- 10. Consider a habit that has kept you from being who God is calling to be. Consciously give up that habit for Lent.
- 11. Spend at least one weekend or evening volunteering that benefits the poor.
- 12. Make a commitment to **fast from insensitive**, **cruel comments** about others. So, no gossiping or going down the Twitter rabbit hole.
- 13. As part of your Lenten almsgiving, make a point to learn more about a particular social issue (immigration, abortion, human trafficking, racism, the environment, public education, child poverty, housing, prison reform, hunger, pornography). Give money to an organization related to your chosen issue that supports the dignity of the human person.
- 14. Pray for someone *by name*. Be mindful of Philo of Alexandria's wise words: "Be kind, for everyone you meet is fighting a great battle."

- two-hour retreat on Sunday, March 8th focused on Care For Our Common Home



OPENNESS AND WELCOME

Pive key themes emerged from our roundtable discussions, when community members shared their hopes and visions about how we might best live out our mission:

- 1. Liturgy and Spirituality
- 2. Vision and Leadership
- 3. Social Justice
- 4. Openness and Welcome
- 5. Authentic Integration



With great consensus around a central goal of strengthening the Paulist Center, participants addressed Openness and Welcome at the Paulist Center, the Church, and the broad community by:

- Developing Small Group prayer & community; these may structure around generations, geography, and themes
- Address the difficult question of access; outside the building (parking?) and inside (lots has been done, but what more needs to be done?)
- Reach out to other Catholic, Christian, and social justice organizations to work in cooperation rather than parallel efforts
- More staff to work on inviting those OUTSIDE the building, in addition to when they get INSIDE the building. Particularly reach out to persons of color
- Become more savvy in our media and social media outreach
- Give training and encouragement for personal testimony: person-to-person
- Monitor our efforts by establishing metrics for evaluation
