BY CHRIST'S WOUNDS, WE ARE HEALED

When Jesus appeared to the disciples in the Upper Room on Easter Sunday, was he suffering pain from standing on feet that had been shattered during his crucifixion? Or were Jesus' wounds merely cosmetic, to help the disciples recognize who he is? I don't know.

We suffer from all kinds of wounds - personal flaws, damage from sins we've committed, harm from sins committed by others against us, and circumstances that aren't sinful but just make life difficult. It's a disconcerting but fundamental truth for each of us: whether or not we still suffer from our wounds, they continue to define who we have become.

One of the most influential books I've read is The Wounded Healer by Henri Nouwen. The title comes from a Jewish fable: the Messiah sits among the wounded, for the Messiah is himself wounded. The difference between the Messiah and the others is that the Messiah tends to his own wounds in a such way that he can quickly jump up and tend to others, if needed.

As uncomfortable as it sounds, Nouwen argues that all of us need to understand ourselves as wounded healers. Fifty-one years ago, Nouwen wrote this paragraph that seems to describe these past three years of pandemic:

What are our wounds? They have been spoken about in many ways by many voices. Words such as "alienation," "separation," "isolation," and "loneliness" have <mark>been used to name our wounded conditio</mark>n. Maybe the word "loneliness" best expresses our immediate experience and therefore most fittingly enables us to understand our brokenness.

The central premise of The Wounded Healer is that loneliness is the fundamental wound that all human beings carry. It's not caused by sin. It's a circumstance that results from God creating each of us with an individual identity that is distinct from the rest of the universe.

When we deny our loneliness, we expect that something or someone else can fill up the emptiness inside of us. We will judge every project and relationship by the merits of what we can receive from it. We may become cynical or bitter. If we accept our loneliness, we can spend our lives compassionately supporting one another in this wound we share, rather than viewing others as a means to escape the wound that we think we alone possess.

As Jesus displayed his wounds to the disciples who had so recently betrayed him, saying "Peace be with you... whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained," the disciples probably felt overwhelmed by God's divine, limitless mercy. As Nouwen quotes from that Jewish fable, "The [Messiah] is coming - not tomorrow, but today, not next year, but this year, not after all our misery is passed, but in the middle of it, not in another place but right here, where we are standing."

Our wounds give us three things: knowledge of ourselves, compassion for others, and a deeper faith. All three are necessary to have communion with our loving God. May we be so overwhelmed by God's mercy that we feel compelled to share it with others for the remainder of our days!

Fr. Chuck Cunniff, C.S.P. was the Associate Director of the Paulist Center 2018-2022. He is currently on a medical leave of absence - while still living at the Paulist Center 2018-2022. medical leave of absence - while still living at the Paulist Center -as he battles cancer. He offers this update:

My thanks to everyone for your spiritual and physical support (prayers, flowers, emails/notes of concern) as my stage 4 prostate cancer journey continues. The Church's liturgical celebration of the Triduum and Easter Sunday had such a different meaning to me this year as I now deal with a new aspect of my cancer journey. The initial prescriptive regimen (Sept.-Dec.) had good results, but in January my PSA began to increase incrementally. Tests showed a DNA mutation in my prostate cancer, so I am now taking a targeted drug (thank you AstraZeneca charitable foundation!).

Best explanation: it stops the cancer cells from growing. A metastasis in my right thigh has made it weak. I use a cane for balance and safety. I began taking the new drug (along with a pain management regimen) 10 days ago. I am feeling better. Regular blood work and tests will gather information and we will see.

The Paulist Center is hosting an event exploring issues of **faith**, **depression**, **suicide** and **mental illness** in a prayerful, pastoral setting with **Dr. Jessica Coblentz**, **Dr. Elizabeth Antus** and **Paulist Fr. Stuart Wilson-Smith**, facilitated by our own **Patty Simpson**, **MDiv**.



The event will include communal prayer, sharing of the presenters' personal and faith call to their work, presentations on their work, time for attendees' private personal reflection, a breakout session, and a concluding conversation with our presenters. Jessica is an associate professor at St. Mary's College, and a former young adult minister at the Paulist Center. Elizabeth is an assistant professor at Boston College. Stu is an associate pastor at Old St. Mary's Parish in Chicago, and served here for a summer as a Paulist student. In addition to her work as Pastoral Administrator at the Center, Patty is the denominational counselor to Catholic students at Harvard Divinity School and an Instructor in Ministry there. All four

share vulnerably and are motivated in their work from their personal experiences and their faith. Jessica and Elizabeth are producing ground-breaking theological work in the areas of faith and depression and suicide. Stu and Patty allow their personal experiences to shape their pastoral encounters, preaching and social media shares. Please note that this will be a pastoral and educational setting, but not a professional/clinical counseling setting. The event will be in-person only (not hybrid), but is open to all.
