VIRTUS TRAINING TO BE REQUIRED FOR ALL VOLUNTEERS BY SEPTEMBER 2023

Dear Paulist Center Community Members -

In an effort to continue to improve the safety of church spaces for all, the Archdiocese and its Office of Child Advocacy has announced, starting this September, ALL volunteers and ALL liturgical ministers, not just those who work directly with children, will have new things they are required to do/provide, in addition to the initial and then annual Criminal Offender Record Information check (CORI) previously required:

- Attend an in-person three-hour VIRTUS training once.
- Those already VIRTUS trained will need to provide us with a copy of their completion certificate (but not yet!).
- Be CORI'd initially and then annually through the Center (We will provide you the forms and collect them from you at the appropriate times. You must be CORI'd by the Center to volunteer here, even if you are also CORI'd elsewhere for other purposes.).
- Acknowledge and agree to the Archdiocesan Volunteer Code of Conduct (link at: https://www.bostoncatholic.org/protecting-children-word-welcome).
- Fill out/update a volunteer application/reference/emergency contact form annually.
- Those who work directly with children will be required to provide two references to be contacted, although those who have previously volunteered and are known to the staff can have staff be their references.

To make attending VIRTUS training as easy as possible (it is required to be in-person), we have arranged for a session to be held at the Paulist Center on Sunday, June 4, from 12:00 - 3:00 PM.

You may also attend a session elsewhere, as long as you complete the session and provide the Center with proof of that, by the end of September 2023. To find other sessions, go to www.VIRTUSonline.org. On the left side of the page click on "First Time Registrant." Select "View list of sessions" and select "Boston (Archdiocese)" from the drop down menu.

We're still learning what the Archdiocese will require in terms of record keeping and formats for collecting the required information and will provide further details as we learn them.

For now:

- If you have never been VIRTUS trained and wish to continue (or start) serving in almost any capacity at the Center, please plan on attending the June 4th VIRTUS training session here or make plans to attend one elsewhere.
- Register at this link **VIRTUS Registration**.
- If you have previously been VIRTUS trained, plan on getting a copy of your completion certificate to give/show to us, (but don't email it to us until we ask! We are not ready to record this information.). Go to:

The Paulist Center has always strived to make our community a safe space for children and all vulnerable people. We understand that these new requirements present an initial inconvenience, but trust our members will appreciate the intent behind them and will comply with the new requirements as soon as possible in order to continue engaging our large and growing body of dedicated volunteers - a hallmark of our community.

LET NO ONE WALK ALONE

I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you. John 14:18

I have been an adult "orphan" for 29 years – almost half my life at this point. My Dad died when I was 25, my Mom when I was 32. Not tragically young to be orphaned, but somewhat young today.

While both the Greek and the Hebrew words for orphan can mean a child who is fatherless, "orphan" derives from a Greek root term meaning "to be alone, deprived." Some scholars say the Hebrew traces back more accurately to a root meaning "lonely." Today the word most commonly refers to children who tragically lose both parents before the age of 18. But there are many losses in our lives that can make us feel "orphaned." For me, two other such losses stand out. Senior year in high school I lost my friend, Stephen, a "second brother" to my family, to a random murder. Just over six years ago, as many of you know, we lost our 25 year old son, Owen, to suicide. Owen's 32nd birthday would be this Monday, May 15th, the date of which, coincidentally, is the 39th anniversary of Stephen's death.

Each of these losses evoked feelings of loneliness and deprivation of the physical presence, support, comfort and earthly love of these incredibly significant relationships in my life. In addition, Stephen's loss evoked fear and anxiety around random acts of violence. Owen's evoked "what ifs" - wonderings of whether anything could have been done that would have allowed him to still be here with us.

I imagine the disciples, including Mary, were feeling many of these same feelings in the days and weeks after Jesus' arrest and death. **Fear** - of the authorities. **Anxiety** - about the future. **Depression** - from the profound loss of their son and friend, the One they had given up everything to follow. Maybe even some foolishness - now how were they going to show their faces to their families, their former employers? **Shame** - Peter for multiple denials, Thomas for doubt, Judas (the loneliest of all?) for betrayal, to name a few. **What-ifs** - could they have done anything to have prevented Jesus' death? **Uncertainty** – what were they supposed to do next? Even after the resurrected Jesus appeared to them, he promptly told them that he would soon be leaving them again, a second loss after a momentary joy.

We can be certain the disciples and apostles experienced all these emotions. Jesus, fully human, also experienced them and understood them. As a loving friend, he promised that he would not leave them – and, thereby, us – orphaned, abandoned, lonely. He would get God to send the Spirit, who would be with them – and, thereby, us - not just for a few years, but for always. Jesus knew that to ward off loneliness, fear, anxiety, depression, shame, what-ifs, uncertainty, the depths of despair, we need accompaniment by a holy, life-affirming, steadfast, compassionate love. I was incredibly fortunate, and remain eternally grateful, that I had and felt the gift of this kind of love and support, both physically and spiritually, during my times of feeling most "orphaned."

May is Mental Health Awareness Month. Loneliness, anxiety, depression, fear and shame are raging epidemics in our world. None of us are immune. Even while dealing with our own "stuff," can we be part of a solution by modeling Jesus and channeling the Comforter, the Spirit, in our accompaniment of others we encounter on our journeys? Can we be that holy, life-affirming, steadfast, compassionate love for someone? All we have is today. We or those we love could be gone tomorrow. As we sang at Owen's funeral, in the words of Rory Cooney's Jerusalem, My Destiny, "We have set our hearts for the way; this journey is our destiny. Let no one walk alone. The journey makes us one."

I will not leave you orphans (lonely); I will come to you. So may we model our teacher and friend.

FR CHUCK HEALTH UPDATE - MAY 2, 2023

As many of you know, for the past 11 months I have been dealing with Stage 4 metastatic prostate cancer. After Christmas, my PSA numbers began to rise. My oncologist ordered tests and scans, which revealed that the prostate cancer had developed a gene mutation and was not reacting to the previous treatments anymore. By the end of March, I was in pain and getting weak. My oncologist recommended a new course of treatment, along with a pain management program. I accepted her recommendation and on April 5,



I began a new prescription drug from AstraZeneca (their charitable arm is paying for the prescription drug in full!). Over the last month, I have felt better every day! This new drug, which is a DNA targeted specific drug in pill form, seems to be working as my PSA dropped 36 points in 3 weeks! Many thanks for all your prayers and physical support! It is working!!

As I feel better, I am trying to be present – usually at the end of our weekend Masses here at the Paulist Center. My hope is to return to some limited pastoral ministry (AA conversations, marriage prep, conversations about life/death/health or God's love and presence in our lives right now).
