NEXT VIRTUS TRAINING AT THE PAULIST CENTER - SUNDAY, OCTOBER 29

Due to new regulations issued by the US Conference of Catholic Bishops, we need **every** volunteer — including money counters and members of social justice advocacy groups — to go through **VIRTUS training**, fill out a Massachusetts Criminal Offender Record Information (**CORI**) form, plus fill out/acknowledge receiving a few other items that we will email about after the October VIRTUS session.

VIRTUS is a national program to educate people on how to protect children and vulnerable adults from those people who might wish them harm. We would like everyone over age 18 in the Paulist Center Community to complete VIRTUS training at some point, whether or not they volunteer with a ministry. Everyone who is a volunteer must complete the VIRTUS training at least once in their lifetime *before the end of November*, or we cannot allow you to volunteer anymore.

The Paulist Center is hosting a training session 12 - 3pm, Sunday, October 29, facilitated by our own Rachel Rumely and Lucia Papile. Pre-registration is needed and spots are limited. We ask you to pre-register as soon as possible to be sure all of our members who wish to attend this session will have a slot. Pre-register <u>here</u>.

- On the left side of the page, click on "First-Time Registrant"
- Then "Begin the registration process"
- From the pull-down menu, choose "Boston, MA (Archdiocese)" only
- Follow the rest of the prompts
- Choose October 29, 2023, 12 pm at the Paulist Center when asked which workshop you want to attend

If you can't make it on October 29, to find other locations:

- Click on this link: other training dates/locations in the Archdiocese
- On the left side of the page click on "First Time Registrant"
- Select "View list of sessions"
- Select "Boston (Archdiocese)"

Those already VIRTUS trained other than at our session this past June (we have what we need if you attended here in June) will need to provide us with a copy of your completion certificate before the end of November. Please send a copy of your completion certificate to Patty as soon as possible. To get a copy of your certificate, go to www.virtusonline.org/virtus/virtus-help-faq.cfm and look for "Printing Certificates/Attendance Credit" under the Frequently Asked Questions.

Each volunteer must fill out a **CORI** before being allowed to volunteer and annually thereafter. It's a form that gives the Archdiocese of Boston permission to request a name-based criminal background check from the state of Massachusetts. Fill the CORI out in the sacristy before or after Sunday Mass or in the receptionist's office during the week. You will need to show a state-approved ID (such a valid driver's license or passport) to a staff member as part of filling out the form.

A FAVORITE SAINT

Note: The 150th Anniversary of the Birth of St. Thérèse was celebrated on October 1st.

I want to share with you a true story of a most remarkable communication I had in my prayer to St. Thérèse of Lisieux, known as the Little Flower.

When I first answered "the call", I didn't think too much about what kind of priest I might want to be as I grew up apart from Catholic schooling and I only knew the diocesan priests at my local parish - St. Albert the Great in East Weymouth.

So, upon entering the St. John's Seminary College in Brighton in my junior year, I was fairly ignorant about many ecclesial notions and vocabulary. I made friends with one of the men who had some things in common with me, including having an older brother die prematurely. My brother was killed in 1980 in a car accident and my friend's brother was killed in the midst of a drug deal gone bad.

Early on, some of the more pious students introduced a prayer card with an image of a nun on it who was holding a bouquet of roses. They talked excitedly about a certain novena that could be prayed to this saint who had the habit (pun intended) of answering prayer requests that were brought to her. The way a person knew that she heard their prayer and promised to assist was that the petitioner would receive a sign of a rose or roses. We were told it would be something unusual about the way the rose would appear.

This tradition goes back to when the 24 year old saint was on her deathbed, (her suffering from TB lasted for more than a year!) when she told the sisters gathered around her that she would spend her time in heaven "showering the earth with roses". Apparently, after Thérèse passed away, some of the sisters must have tested her with prayer requests and sure enough, each received a rose in some fashion.

The other reason for her popularity in the early 20th century was that she was the first declared saint that we had a photograph of!

After being given the prayer card, the first thing I thought to myself was, "What's a novena?" After learning the instructions were given on the back of the prayer card, I read them. The petitioner was to pray for nine consecutive days (hence the word novena) 5 Our Father's, 5 Hail Mary's, 5 Glory Be's along with a lovely little rhyming prayer asking:

"Dear St. Thérèse please pick me a rose from your heavenly garden above and send it to me with a message of love.

Tell God to grant me the favor I thee implore

and tell Him each day I will love Him more and more."

But there was a catch in the instructions, which I thought to be a bit absurd. The prayers were to be said before llam each day! I remember boldly thinking to myself, "Well what happens after llam? Is this her coffee break and she just can't listen to any more prayers?"

But I decided to pray for my friend's brother whose death was not what one would call a moment of grace – seeking to sell or buy drugs.

So I began to dutifully pray the novena. However, on day four and then again on the sixth day, I almost forgot to say the prayers before Ilam! I quickly said them under my breath in the middle of classes on ecclesiology and New Testament studies. I didn't very much relish the thought of having to start all over again if I missed a day of prayer, so I struck a bargain with this young saint. (Admittedly, it was a one-sided deal.) I told her that I would stop praying this novena on the 7th day. One week would have to suffice for her to pluck a rose and send it to me. I called this shortened novena a "Septima".

But I had another concern. "When am I going to receive this heaven-sent rose? Will I get it within a month, a year, or will I be 88 years old when my rose arrives?"

I told St. Thérèse I would give her one week from the 7th day of prayer. As the days went by, my curiosity grew as to whether I would get a rose. ...
