

#### STATEMENT FROM PAULIST CENTER STAFF

he Paulist Center's staff joins Catholic Advocacy groups, southern border dioceses, and the U.S. Conference of Latholic Bishops in expressing deep concern after the current administration signed a series of executive orders last week.


We concur with Archbishop Timothy Briglio, President of the US Bishops' Conference, stating "Some provisions contained in the Executive Orders, such as those focused on the treatment of immigrants and refugees, foreign aid, expansion of the death penalty, and the environment, are deeply troubling, many of which will harm the most vulnerable among us."

We will continue the good work of our Immigration Advocacy Group in supporting our brothers and sisters in Christ who are also immigrants, migrants, and/or refugees.

We are also deeply concerned about President Trump signing an executive action stating that the U.S. government will now recognize only two sexes, male and female. This executive order represents a new era of barriers to access essential resources and services for LGBTQ+ people in general, and for transgender people in particular.

We continue to believe that God loves LGBTO+ persons like anyone else and will continue to support and stand by our beloved LGBTO+ community members and the broader LGBTO+ community.

## THERE IS SO MUCH WE DO NOT KNOW...LET'S EDUCATE OURSELVES!


What do YOU remember about the following persons/events?:

- Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. There are some facts about Dr. King that some white persons and some persons of color may not know or may have forgotten: Where was Dr. King born? What state and place was he assassinated?
- Mary McLeod Bethune Why and what importance did she 'play and hold' in the lives of Black people?
- Phillip Randolph Who was he and why is he 'fondly remembered'?
- Dr. George Washington Carver What is he known for?
- Why is the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, AL, remembered in Civil Rights history?
- As a Catholic: What do you know (or remember) about the following dates or persons?
  - Pierre Toussaint? Henriette de Lille? Mary Lange? Augustus Tolton? August 1968, Pittsburg, PA?
  - St. Martin de Porres was a who lived in .
  - Name of the Catholic pope who divided the world giving Spain and Portugal 'ownership'. The Treaty was called "the Papal Bull of 1493", giving these countries the right to enslave all the inhabitants on the land they "conquered." This gave rise to the Doctrine of Discovery which was only repudiated by the Pope in March of 2023.

#### COMMMUNITY GIFT

The Paulist Center gives 5% of our annual offertory to 52 other charitable organizations with missions consonant with our own. These organizations receive an equal amount from our annual offertory.

This weekend, **Feb 8 - 9**, we raise up <u>The Massachusetts Bail Fund</u> (MBF). The MBF pays bail to secure freedom from pre-trial incarceration so that those who cannot afford their bail can be in their community to fight their case. Pre-trial freedom allows individuals, families, and communities to stay productive, together, and stable.



Massachusetts jails are filled with people awaiting trial simply because they cannot afford bail. Sitting in jail on bail leads to longer incarceration times, lost jobs, lost housing, and devastating disruption to families.
