VIRTUS TRAINING TO BE REQUIRED FOR ALL VOLUNTEERS (AND REQUESTED FOR ALL ADULT MEMBERS) BY SEPTEMBER 2023 TRAINING SESSION @ THE CENTER ON SUNDAY, JUNE 4

In an effort to continue to improve the safety of church spaces for all, the Archdiocese and its Office of Child Advocacy has announced, starting this September, that ALL volunteers and ALL liturgical ministers, not just those who work directly with children, will have new things to do/provide, in addition to the initial, and then annual, Criminal Offender Record Information check (CORI) previously required:

One of these new things is for virtually all adult members of our community, not just those who work directly with children, to be VIRTUS trained. VIRTUS is a program implemented across the United States to train everyone how best to protect children & vulnerable adults from people who wish them harm. Due to our community's strong commitment to the protection of children and all vulnerable people, and the high rate of involvement of our members in many ministries and activities here at the Center, we are asking ALL adult members of the Center who have never received VIRTUS training - whether or not you are currently actively involved in any ministry or volunteer roles here - to register for our training session on Sunday, June 4, from Noon - 3pm. This is a one-time training and may only be done in-person, not virtually.

- If you cannot attend this session at the Center, you may attend a session elsewhere, this summer and provide the Center with a copy of your completion certificate. To find other sessions, go to www.VIRTUSonline.org. On the left side of the page click on "First Time Registrant." Select "View list of sessions" and select "Boston (Archdiocese)"
- Those already VIRTUS trained will need to provide us with a copy of their completion certificate (but not yet!).
- If you have previously been VIRTUS trained, plan on getting a copy of your completion certificate to give/show to us (but don't email it to us until we ask! We are not ready to record this information.). Go to www.virtusonline.org/virtus/virtus-help-faq.cfm and look for "Printing Certificates/Attendance Credit" under the Frequently Asked Questions.
- We will attempt to have another in-house session in early September, but the more people trained earlier, the smoother the picking up of activities will be in September.

In addition to VIRTUS training, all volunteers will:

- Be CORI'd initially and then annually through the Center (We will provide you the forms and collect them from you at the appropriate times. You must be CORI'd by the Center to volunteer here, even if you are also CORI'd elsewhere for other purposes.).
- Acknowledge and agree to the Archdiocesan Volunteer Code of Conduct (link at: https://www.bostoncatholic.org/
 protecting-children-word-welcome).
- Fill out/update a volunteer application/reference/emergency contact form annually.
- Those who work directly with children will be required to provide two references to be contacted, although those who have previously volunteered and are known to the staff can have staff be their references.

We're still learning what the Archdiocese will require in terms of record keeping and formats for collecting the required information and will provide further details as we learn them.

The Paulist Center has always strived to make our community a safe space for children and all vulnerable people. We understand that these new requirements present an initial inconvenience, but trust our members will appreciate the intent behind them and will comply with the new requirements as soon as possible in order to continue engaging our large and growing body of dedicated volunteers - a hallmark of our community.

GETTING DOWN TO THE MISSION PART

We're familiar with the scene when Jesus sends the disciples out, two by two, on a mission. He instructs them to travel throughout Judea and beyond, to heal the sick, to cast out unclean spirits, and to proclaim the reign of God. And if that wasn't challenging enough, Jesus tells them to take nothing with them but a walking stick - no bread, no bag, no money, not even a second tunic. (Mark 6:8)

In "Two by Two," an episode from the TV series *The Chosen*, the creators vividly depict the disciples' shock and resistance to Jesus' command. We witness their barrage of protests and questions: "Rabbi, we are not you, how are we supposed to heal?" "What are we supposed to eat?" "They will kill us in that region." "How can we do this without you?" Unphased, Jesus firmly but gently, tells them to trust him and believe that God's Spirit will be with them. Then he departs alone.

In the first reading for the Solemnity of the Ascension – celebrated this past Thursday – we encounter a similar scene. A moment of shock and confusion for the disciples that no doubt elicited more questions: "Is he really gone?" "What are we supposed to do now?" "Where else are we supposed to look?" One can imagine how unprepared and disconcerted the disciples must have felt.

In Paul's letter to the Ephesians from that same liturgy, we hear the prayer, "May the God of our Lord...give you a Spirit of wisdom and revelation resulting in knowledge of him. May the eyes of your hearts be enlightened that you may know the hope that belongs to his call." What a prayer for reluctant, mostly confused disciples! And yet, the gifts offered in this prayer are what both the disciples and all of us need to move forward – to get down to the mission part.

These very gifts – wisdom, revelation, and enlightenment – are vital for the fulfillment of Christ's mission. For it is only by remaining open and receptive to these gifts, imparted by the Spirit, that we can gain the fortitude to forge ahead with a God-sized vision of hope for the world. It is a powerful prayer that invites us to let go of the thoughts, judgments, and fear that keep us from reading the signs of the times and trusting in Jesus' promise.

Author and educator, Mary McGlone, CSJ, equates our circumstances with that of the disciples immediately after the Ascension: "Like them, we must face the very real dispiriting events of our times, the circumstances that cannot and should not be ignored. We may share their desire to simply stand looking heavenward for a solution, but we will also hear the promptings of angels and prophets who remind us that prayer is only part of the equation."

As we journey towards the celebration of Pentecost, may we have the courage to pray for the blessings of wisdom, awareness, and enlightened hearts. That through our prayer we will be impelled to "get down to the mission part" and act together, strengthened and encouraged in the knowledge that Christ, who sends us forth to preach the good news, will be with us for all eternity.
